## WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

## HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA PROGRAMS (GED AND NEDP)

GED and NEDP courses are available to adults seeking their high school diplomas. Test preparation and basic reading and math classes for those preparing to take the Maryland GED are free, although students must purchase their textbooks. Learners are placed in classes according to their level of need, and most classes meet 60 hours per semester.

Mature adults with significant life experiences who can demonstrate academic competencies and life skills may seek their high school diploma through the National External Diploma Program (NEDP). The cost of the NEDP program is \$200. To enroll, individuals must qualify in math, reading, and writing.

The Innovation Hub at Prince George's Community College offers a physical and virtual space where businesses can collaborate with others and get help with new ideas. Students, faculty, businesses, and community members work together to generate new ideas and create new or improve existing processes, services, and products. Programs and services include:

FY2020-2021 Highlights

The InnoHub has partnered with the Good Food Consortium to address **food insecurity** in Prince George's County. Fifteen students were recruited to design solutions to combat the problem, which could ultimately impact the County's disproportionate rate of diet-related illness. Three blended design teams were

created, each with high school and college

students. Faculty and staff mentors, and

external entrepreneurs have been leading

the teams through a process that involves

research, prototyping, and exhibition.

The College's selection by the Education Design Lab as one of six community colleges with **extraordinary entrepreneurial potential** means it will participate in a scalable pathways model to improve outcomes for underserved students. This opportunity was facilitated by the Prince George's Community College Foundation and the Office of Institutional Advancement's Grants Office.

The Design Lab grant and extensive support over two years are valued at \$417,000, which will cover the cost of:

- Developing stackable credentials for in-demand career fields such as allied health and technology
- Enrolling at least
   600 students
- Expanding the College's **Pathways** initiative

For the past 30 years, Client Solutions has helped Prince George's County businesses with their organizational development and training needs. Although pandemic challenges included transitioning to an online environment, instructor-led education and training have returned with guidelines.

### FY2020-2021 Highlights

#### **Client Solutions continued its ongoing partnerships with:**

**The Thomas Shortman Training Fund** (TSTF) to help members gain the education and skills needed to grow in the quickly changing services industry by providing them with a variety of adult education classes at the College's University Town Center and Skilled Trades Center locations:

- Academic skills, including reading and math
- English as a Second Language (ESL)
- Introductory computer skills
- Skilled trades such as basic plumbing, carpentry, and electricity
- License preparation courses such as CPR

**CASA** to provide workforce development training for Latino and immigrant populations in Prince George's County. A new 50-hour solar course was added to the three 60-hour courses provided for CASA's vocational training program:

- Building maintenance engineer
- · Heating and ventilation
- · Air conditioning and refrigeration
- Introduction to solar photovoltaics

**Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS)** to help deliver courses that novice PGCPS teachers need to certify in the state of Maryland. The classes are offered through the College's education and psychology departments, and participants are provided coursework in human growth and development, teaching methodology, student assessments, special education, and literacy.

## COMMUNITY **MEMBERS**

The African American Studies Institute engages in digital outreach, educational programs, research, and community partnerships, making an impact locally, regionally, and internationally. It holds space for meaningful cultural, social, and political participation of people of African descent.



**Iyelli Ichile, Ph.D.,** is director of the Institute, which is anchored in the Division of the Humanities, English, and Social Sciences at Prince George's Community College. The Black Culture Matters series, funded with a \$1,000 mini-grant from Maryland Humanities and matching funds from the College, provided lively and well-attended lectures and discussions

#### **BOOK BRIDGE PROJECT**

The Book Bridge Project has since 2005 brought County residents and the Prince George's Community College community together in shared learning experiences about contemporary issues through literature. The program offers opportunities for lively discussions, enhanced

critical thinking skills, and a better understanding of others' views and perspectives.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS FROM FY2020-2021**

A series of personal essays by Nigerian-American author Bassey Ikpi in the book "I'm Telling the Truth, But I'm Lying" prompted the Book Bridge discussions during the school year. A wide range of books, including nonfiction and fiction, have been featured over the years.

#### **CAREER SERVICES**

Prince George's Community College offers career help to students, alumni, and community members. The services include:

received through the Prince George's County Council Non-Departmental Grant Program. The Center distributed 50 turkeys and gift cards to Prince George's County families for Thanksgiving in collaboration with the Next Steps Training and Education Program at Prince George's Community College.

#### FY2020-2021 HIGHLIGHTS

The Prince George's Community College Foundation facilitated more than \$2.7 million in gifts and pledges to the College during FY2021, a record in a non-campaign year. That included an in-kind Africana art collection valued at \$158,000, featuring the work of some of the most influential Black artists of the century.





The PGCC Foundation held its biennial Partners for Success Gala virtually for the first time in the event's history due to the pandemic. ## FY2020-2021 HIGHLIGHTS

Prince George's Community College earned a top ranking by Intelligent.com, a higher education resource guide

that helps students make informed academic decisions, for having the "Best Online Business

Administration Associate Degree Program." The College's Business Administration program is also designated as "Best in the Southeast."

The PGCC Public Safety and Law Department is recognized as one of the "Best Online Associate

Programs in Criminal Justice" by Best Value Schools. It is also rated #5 out of 20,

based on the overall quality of the Criminal Justice program, value, and adaptability to the workforce.

The percentage of first-time college students who earned at least 15 credits in their first year has almost

doubled from four years ago. Of the fall 2020 cohort, 32.1% earned 15 or more credits in their first year, compared to 17.1% of the fall 2016 cohort.

**Dual and Concurrent Enrollment** allows students to get a head start on college by taking college classes in high school.

**Early Admission** for high school students who fulfill their graduation requirements early and can attend Prince George's Community College full-time in their senior year.



## **ACHIEVEMENTS**





JaQuon Epps, a Ph.D. professor of sociology, completed research on the intersection between race, gender, and mental health with a focus on the disproportionate rates of lupus in Black women.

Julie Gordon and Jaison Novich are professors who created an eightweek Online Educational Resource (OER) training course that equips faculty with the skills and knowledge to develop classes that use open resources so that students do not have to purchase textbooks.

Larry D. Miller, an adjunct humanities professor and a weekday WUSA9 anchor, reported on a complaint by two Prince George's County homeowners who said that their large, luxury homes failed to meet anticipated appraisal values because they are located in majority-Black neighborhoods.



Miller's story brought attention to concerns about biased home appraisals in Prince George's County, which appear to be part of an ongoing problem. A coalition of community leaders, realtors, elected officials, and concerned citizens across the County now provide information on the issue of biased appraisals. The Fair and Unbiased Appraisal Advocates (FUAA) also has a new website that offers information and resources. blackhomesmatter.org.



History professor Benjamin Hurwitz, Ph.D., served as assistant director of the Enslaved Children of George Mason (ECGM) Project which seeks to reconstruct the 18th-century experiences of enslaved children and adults on the Gunston Hall Plantation in Virginia.



Laura Ellsworth, associate dean; Percy Alston, chair and professor; Ashanti Bryant Foster, Ed.D., chair and professor; and Charles Perry. D.M., professor; presented at the virtual 31st Annual Association of Faculties for Advancement of Community College Teaching (AFACCT) Conference on January 7, 2021. In the presentation, "The Perfect Storm: How One Division Reinvented Itself Post-Realignment," the panelists described their unique experiences in a semester-long "boot camp" that expanded their knowledge, skills, and abilities in leading their respective departments as new chairs and how they built a collaborative, interdisciplinary division team focused on continuous improvement and student success.

History professor Sharita J. Thompson, Ph.D., was feature in a Washington Post article on May 29, 2021, that described her work teaching DC police recruits about the history and culture of African American communities. Thompson also participated in a campus panel discussion: "Bridging the Gap: Police and Community Relations."

William (Bill) Miller, a professor of chemistry, guided his students in research using handheld refractometers in remote environments. Their work was recently published in the Journal of Chemical Education. Although chemistry experiments are typically conducted in a laboratory environment, pandemic challenges prompted Miller to find ways to pilot remote experiments in his courses using everyday objects. He did this successfully and has since presented his findings at national conferences.



Shelly Thorpe, an adult education lead instructor, was awarded the 2021 Maryland Association for Adult, Community and Continuing Education (MAACCE) Instructor Award for her dedication and expertise in teaching and learning. MAACCE is a nonprofit organization providing leadership in Maryland for those interested in advancing education as a lifelong process.

28 Prince George's Community College Annual Report 2020-2021 **29**  Prince George's Community College introduced its vision, mission, and guiding principles in the FY2019–2021 Strategic Plan, effective on the first day of the Fiscal Year 2019 (July 1, 2018). Through the plan, the College advanced its goals of increasing student success, regional impact, and organizational excellence as outlined in a final report issued on September 9, 2021. The College developed the plan with the help of a 17-member Strategic Planning Council, a six-member Key Performance Indicator Group, and three Implementation Planning Teams (29 total contributors). The College was intentional in its approach to establishing, monitoring, and reporting ongoing progress against the plan.

Here are the goals reached and some of the programs implemented as part of the Strategic Plan:







#### STUDENT SUCCESS

**Online new student orientation**—providing new and transfer students an efficient, engaging, and easy-to-complete online orientation that saves time and money traveling to campus.

**Navigate software**—integrating academic planning with registration so that credit students and advisors can collaboratively view and create current and future term schedules to fit the goals and needs of their selected career pathway.

**Open educational resources**—offering more than 730 course sections in FY2021 without textbooks, Z-courses make education more affordable for 10,300 students and save a total of nearly \$1.4 million in textbook costs.

**Pathways**—mapping clear academic and career paths for students to achieve their goals saves them time and money.

#### **REGIONAL IMPACT**

**Center for Performing Arts**—increasing the College's impact on the region, this facility meets the growing demand for premier entertainment space and offers students **a place to perform** where they can hone their skills in a professional environment. The 173,000 square-foot facility hosts local, regional, and **international** performances in five state-of-the-art venues. The center is conveniently located with plenty of parking, and space is available for lease for public and private events.

**Workforce development roundtables**—participating in the Education Design Lab's Community College Growth Engine Fund (CCGEF) provided Prince George's Community College with sponsorship for **innovative coaching**, support, and relevant market data. It also helped create the curricula needed to connect learners to higher-wage jobs.

The College convened two workforce development roundtable discussions about the changing needs of employers and learners. Participants included local employers, PGCC learners, the Prince George's Chamber of Commerce, and Prince George's County Public Schools. **The College analyzed and disseminated insights** and feedback to participants following each roundtable discussion, and incorporated into its plans new ways to **prepare students for available jobs.** 

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL EXCELLENCE**

**Business process transformation**—launching a new Project Management and Strategy Office in FY2020, Prince George's Community College enhanced its ability to select and successfully deliver strategic projects. The College also reviewed and improved the clarity of its procedures, and implemented new time and attendance software. A comprehensive Information Technology (IT) evaluation was completed to address any security risks.

**College website redesign**—condensing more than 3,000 web pages to 300, introducing more visually-appealing pages, and supporting Pathways by making students aware of the technologies and tools for onboarding, enrollment, and registration enhanced the site. The redesign also made it **easier for visitors to find what they were seeking**. The website redesign was unveiled in 2019, resulting in a more sustainable content management system, an improved level of internal excellence, and greater efficacy in showcasing the College's achievements.

The benefits of the Strategic Plan included Prince George's Community College's goals of making crucial gains in student success, achieved through the College's education and positioning of students to perform competitively in higher-wage careers. In addition, Prince George's Community College's increased responsiveness to local and regional workplace requirements impacted the region by providing employers with competent and innovative workers, boosting the economy. The College has also achieved organizational excellence, becoming a higher-performing organization that operates more efficiently, effectively, and with greater purpose.
