Dental Assisting Program Information Session



- Dental Assistants are highly skilled professionals who work closely with dentists to provide patient care, take X-rays, manage the front desk, and schedule appointments typically on a full-time basis.
- According to the <u>Department of Labor</u>, employment for dental assistants are projected to grow 7 percent from 2022 to 2032, faster than the average for all occupations.
- About 55,100 openings for dental assistants are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Many of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire.



What do Dental Assistants do?

- Ensure that patients are comfortable in the dental chair
- Prepare patients and the work area for treatments and procedures
- Sterilize dental instruments
- Hand instruments to dentists during procedures
- Dry patients' mouths using suction hoses and other equipment
- Instruct patients in proper oral hygiene
- Process x-rays and complete lab tasks, under the direction of a dentist
- Keep records of dental treatments
- Schedule patient appointments
- Work with patients on billing and payment


How much do Dental Assistants make?

• According to the U.S. Department of Labor:

The median annual wage for dental assistants was \$44,820 in May 2022. The median wage is the wage at which half the workers in an occupation earned more than that amount and half earned less. The lowest 10 percent earned less than \$31,450, and the highest 10 percent earned more than \$59,200.

In May 2022, the median annual wages for dental assistants in the top industries in which they worked were as follows:

Government \$47,390 Offices of dentists 44,860 Offices of physicians 40,080 Most dental assistants work full time. Some work evenings or weekends.





How long is the program?


• The program is a total of 6 months (including the optional internship).


