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A New Era of Building and Expansion

The college has begun bold new building and renovation initiatives that will exponentially serve to increase its contributions to the community. Employing innovative thinking, three major capital projects represent the most ambitious expansion and renovation initiative undertaken at the Largo Campus since it opened for classes in 1967. This new era kicked off in June with a groundbreaking ceremony marking the start of construction for a brand new Culinary Arts Center and the renovation of Lanham Hall and the Queen Anne Building.

As an institution, Prince George's Community College has made student completion its top priority, integrating goals into "Envision Success," the institution's current strategic plan. To achieve these goals, the college must create and maintain a nurturing, and welcoming environment, offering not only first-rate academics and relevant career training, but also comprehensive student support services. The capital projects address each component in a systematic way.

Route

The creation of a new Culinary Arts Center will bring the college's culinary arts program to the main campus from its temporary home in Capitol Heights. The program has experienced tremendous growth, but is limited by its current space and location. With a dedicated facility on campus, the popular program can accommodate greater numbers, incorporate the latest equipment, and integrate fully with other campus activities and services.

The Queen Anne Building, one of the original buildings on the Largo campus, will more than triple in size. Refurbishments will upgrade building systems, implement accessibility requirements, modernize finishes and equipment, provide space for a new dance major, and significantly expand performing arts and media offerings on campus.

Renovations to Lanham Hall will address age-related infrastructure deficiencies, while adding 18,949 GSF of space. The building will provide a central location for the college's Workforce Development and Continuing Education programs, as well as consolidate various student support programs and services, and expand the Academy of Health Sciences Middle College High School.

The Capital Projects Planning Committee, representing a cross-section of faculty and staff, held a series of visioning sessions to gauge expectations and needs as they relate to each building. Common themes emerged from the sessions, including the importance of engaging stakeholders from within and outside the college community; placing specialized and highly skilled staff members in all the facilities; and private and public funding partnerships for programs and scholarships.

The construction projects directly impacts the county and its residents. President Dr. Charlene M. Dukes noted, "We are always looking for forward-thinking ways to meet the needs of our students and community. The scope of the capital projects demonstrates the broadness of our mission and the extent to which the college serves a vital function in the region. With these initiatives, we will significantly strengthen our ability to provide academic and career programs, outstanding student support services, integrated business and industry solutions, and vibrant arts and culture programming."

Revitalization of the Arts

The campus and Prince George's County will receive a huge boost with the overhaul of the Queen Anne building. More than 135,000 square feet of space will be added to the building as it is transformed from a 1960s structure to an ultra-modern facility.

The new space will transform programs in music, theatre and mass communications and allow for the addition of musical theatre and dance programs. When complete, the building's highlights will include a renovated 767-seat Hallam Theatre, a 304-seat Proscenium Theatre, a Blackbox Theatre, dance studios, a recital hall, TV and radio stations, instructional theatre and entertainment technology labs, conference rooms, music rehearsal spaces, and an art gallery. Faculty and staff were involved in the process from the very beginning. They were asked what they envisioned for the new building and continue to be involved in developing programs. The result is a plan for a building that is tailored to the specific needs of the college and the community. "We are really excited to build up our programs and enable students to connect to career paths that are available to them in the region. It is going to make a world of difference," said Brenda Mitchell, executive director of the Prince George's Community College Foundation, Inc.

The work will also create new opportunities for increasing partnerships with the community. While college programs previously had to share one theatre with outside orchestras, dance companies and theatre groups, there will soon be plenty of room for simultaneous events and expanded programming. It is also good news for arts lovers. "There is a misconception that people have to venture into Washington, D.C. to see great theatre," said Ennis Allen, chair of Communications and Theatre Department. "This building will help correct that. I hope it will become a focal point for the county, not just the college."

CULINARY ARTS CENTER

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Feeding Economic and Community Development

The Culinary Arts Program started at Prince George's Community College in 2007. Of all people, Edward Whitfield, culinary center coordinator, can enumerate the many benefits of having a dedicated, purpose-built facility on campus. "We will no longer be at the mercy of various facilities, where at any given time, they can ask us for their space back if they need it. Right now, we have only one hot kitchen and one cold kitchen. With multiple kitchens, we can admit more students and offer additional classes that better fit their schedules." said Whitfield.

The new Culinary Arts Center will feature a working kitchen that will enable students to gain practical training while being supervised by instructors in a controlled environment. Two production kitchens will support introductory and classical cooking courses. A community kitchen will be open for continuing education and lifestyle courses, such as wine pairing with food or family-friendly healthy cooking. Large cooking presentations by instructors or visiting chefs will take place in the demonstration kitchen.

Logistically, the new building will make life easier for culinary arts students, who currently have to travel from Capitol Heights, Maryland to other college locations to take their non-culinary arts classes. The Largo campus location will offer more parking and Metro accessibility. All these factors will enable students to graduate more quickly and easily. With the hospitality industry in Prince George's County booming, this is good news for both students and employers.

"We have so many employers calling and requesting workers," said Chef Whitfield. "We try and direct students to the career that is best for them." With the opening of the new Culinary Arts Center, the program will train and educate students to fulfill the needs of employers in every segment of the food service industry. At the same time, the center will offer educational and enriching community programs year-round, highlighting the growing influence of hospitality on contemporary culture.

MGM National Harbor Partners with Prince George's Community College

MGM National Harbor, the new luxury destination resort in Prince George's County, has partnered with Prince George's Community College on several innovative initiatives as part of its commitment to corporate social responsibility. Community spirit are integral elements of MGM National Harbor's culture. Its contributions go beyond mere monetary—MGM's partner-ship shows a dedication to time, talent, labor and spirit and a commitment to diversity.

The \$1.4 billion resort is a short distance from Washington, D.C. and features premier amenities such as high-end branded retail, meeting space; and restaurants from renowned local, national and international chefs. As the new Culinary Arts Center takes shape, a major contribution from MGM National Harbor will fund a state-of-the-art culinary display kitchen. The excitement from this contribution is spurring additional interest toward naming opportunities in the new center. This is not MGM's first endeavor with Prince George's Community College. MGM National Harbor presented a \$100,000 check to the college for a scholarship program in support of the Hospitality Express Course. The 13-week program enabled eligible Prince George's County residents to prepare for jobs in the hospitality industry. In addition, the resort collaborated on the Prince George's Community College Dealer School, a workforce training program, that was launched summer 2016, and has since provided candidates with the

skills needed to apply for and attain exciting and rewarding jobs in the resort's casino table games department. LANHAM HALL RENOVATION AND EXPANSION



Student-centered Support Services

After nearly half a century of service, Lanham Hall is undergoing a revamping that will transform and repurpose the building. The project updates an existing 77,249 square feet and adds a 150-seat lecture hall, green roofs, vast glass curtain wall systems, a grand staircase, and a three-story glass enclosure.

Various student support programs and services, currently located throughout the college, will be consolidated on the first floor of the building. Workforce Development and Continuing Education (WDCE) programs spread out across the Largo campus and other locations, will be housed on the second floor, with the Academy of Health Sciences occupying the third floor.

Bringing WDCE programming offices together will improve operations and ensure first-class service for students in an area that relies heavily on flexibility and the ability to respond quickly to business and industry needs. It advances a goal articulated by Dr. Yvette Snowden, interim vice president for WDCE. "When we look at the growth that's going on in the county now and what we anticipate coming down the pike, we absolutely want our students at the forefront, positioned with the skill sets and aptitudes that are needed for the modern workplace."

On the Student Services side, Lanham Hall will serve as what Crystal Smith calls "a student success center." Ms. Smith, director of Student Academics and Advising, said the college offers a wealth of resources, but they have been scattered around campus, sometimes making it a challenge for students to find. In the new Lanham Hall, students will be able to locate all the resources they need in one place, including academic advising, disability support services, tutoring, and career and job planning assistance. While other buildings are targeted toward certain academic areas, she said, the Lanham Hall renovation is intentionally designed to take into consideration the needs of all students. "We are trying to make sure it's a 21st century space, so that when people come in, whether they are a full or part-time degree seeker or here for one course, they feel like it's theirs."

Consolidating student support services in a centralized location will allow Prince George's Community College to reach more students and respond more efficiently and effectively to their needs. The college will welcome students in a contemporary, student-centered facility where they can access a wide range of programs, resources and personal assistance that will help them succeed and complete their goals.

Empowering Diverse Male Student Success

As a K–12 teacher and administrator, Brian Hamlin was getting discouraged. He saw what he described as a lot of diverse males falling through the cracks within a system that was ill-equipped to meet their needs. In 2009, wanting to make a career change, he met with Prince George's Community College president, Dr. Charlene M. Dukes.

The timing was fortuitous. Dr. Dukes was looking for strategies to help minority males enroll in and complete college. As reported in Diverse Issues in Higher Education, the underrepresentation of this population is currently "the worst it has been in the last 30 years." While Prince George's Community College is one of the most diverse community colleges in the state, the disparity is still evident, with men making up only 37 percent of the student body.

The result of the meeting was the birth of the Diverse Male Student Initiatives (DMSI), a program designed to empower and engage male students of color to complete their education and achieve success.

Mr. Hamlin worked with former vice president for Student Affairs, Dr. Tyjaun Lee, to build DMSI from the ground up. The twoyear program emphasizes three principles: academic achievement; leadership and character development;

and career and entrepreneurship readiness. Activities throughout the year include weekly workshops, one-on-one mentoring, dedicated academic advising, and social events. The program culminates in a dinner where participants have a chance to present their personal five-year plans in a friendly competition, dressed as their future selves. Among the program's many successes is Adam Alston. Mr. Alston made the decision to pursue a college education while still incarcerated, realizing it was the key to moving forward with his life. He enrolled soon after being released, and within the first year had a 4.0 and was the DMSI

valedictorian. "We just wrap our arms around the young men, show them that we love them and want them to be successful beyond Prince George's Community College. We will give them all the resources they need and let them be aggressive about pursuing their dreams and goals and we are seeing student success." said Hamlin. Diverse Male Student Initiatives (DMSI) was the subject of a feature-length documentary "Striving for the Extraordinary" which



chronicled a year in the experiences of male students in the DMSI program and has been recognized by the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations (NCMPR) with two District 1 Medallion Awards. The documentary was produced and directed by Prince George's Community College-TV's Angela Mathis and Marshall Johnson who served as associate producer and editor. "It was a monumental project," said Angela Mathis, who directed the film. "Great things are happening on this campus, but the larger community might not be aware of it. Here's a wonderful example to show them what's going on with people's lives," said Mathis. The documentary also won PGCC-TV a 2017 Telly Award in the Educational Institution category. BUILDING pathways to SUCCESS

Dukes, president Prince George's Community College On May 25, 2017, members of the Prince George's County Council unanimously passed its \$8.3 billion dollar budget for fiscal year 2018 that included \$1.7 million to support a new Promise Scholarship Program. The program will serve recent county high school graduates who enroll at Prince George's Community College (PGCC). By making a promise that college tuition will be free for qualified residents, the concept has proven to change the conversation, and therefore the culture, about college attendance at both the individual and institutional levels. When properly designed and implemented, Promise Programs unify the community in pursuit of a common goalthe future success of their youth (Campaign for Free College Tuition, 2016)

"These funds represent a real breakthrough in addressing the challenges that many of our high school-aged residents in Prince George's County are facing when considering how they will fund their higher education pursuits," said Dr. Charlene M. Dukes, president of Prince George's Community College. "We are excited that the county has recognized that providing access to higher education is a priority and that the college is critical in helping to meet that need."

The proposal to create the program originated from legislation stemming from a response to Maryland House Bill 1087, introduced by the Honorable Alonzo Washington, Delegate, District 22. A 16-member task force was convened to study the feasibility of creating the program and provided a recommendation



that it be implemented as a "last-dollar" program, meaning that any funds students receive would cover the costs associated with tuition and mandatory fees that remain after applying all financial resources.

Promise Programs have proven to increase enrollment in public school systems and higher education institutions. These programs bridge the existing education and wage gaps for minority, low-income and first generation students, helping students to present themselves as winning candidates and ensure they are equipped to handle the new challenges four-year institutions and the workforce throw at them.

"Many students feel as though they have an ultimatum where they either are making a living or paying for their education," said Antonio Morrell, formerpresident, Student Governance Association at Prince George's Community College.

The implementation of a Promise Scholarship is an opportunity for county stakeholders to work together to achieve desirable economic and social benefits. Oftentimes, students who know what they want to do, only choose their career field because they aren't aware of other options. The Promise Scholarship Program is beneficial in that it will help students begin conscious and active self-reflection and questioning, which evidence suggests is an important first step. Students in this program will create clear career goals to aim for throughout their education. It's a crucial step that leads students to the career they desire and helps them achieve academic and career success along the way.

"Every stakeholder has a role in making a difference in our community. Investing in education, particularly scholarships for community college students, is something we can all do to impact the workplace, economy and quality of life in Prince George's County," said Larry R. Spriggs, chair, Philanthropy Committee, Prince George's Community College Foundation, Inc.

Prince George's County is among the first five jurisdictions in the state of Maryland to implement a Promise Program and could be added to a list of early adopters of some form of debt-free community college education nationwide.

A 3D Approach—Earn a Bachelor's Degree for \$10K or less

College affordability is a major obstacle facing many high school students and families. To address this issue head-on, the University of Maryland University College (UMUC), Prince George's Community College (PGCC) and Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) announced a pilot scholarship program that will allow high-achieving Prince George's County high school students to earn a bachelor's degree from UMUC for \$10,000 or less, with minimal student loan debt. For some students, the degree could be free.

Students in the Prince George's 3D Scholarship Program will begin an academic pathway that produces welleducated graduates, addresses college affordability, and supports a regional workforce that will respond to the needs of the community. The job market can be complex and difficult to navigate. Students often don't know what options are open to them. Deciding on a career early plays a major role in a students' academic and professional success.

Maryland Senator Jim Rosapepe (D-College Park), a former member of the University System of Maryland Board of Regents, who proposed the program to UMUC and Prince George's Community College stated, "By combining early college credits with online college courses, this new program is a big step toward raising high school standards and cutting college costs for Prince George's students. In addition, Kevin M. Maxwell, chief executive officer, Prince George's County Public Schools expressed, "I am thrilled that our students can take part in this exciting opportunity, This pilot will allow more students to achieve their dream of earning a college degree at an affordable cost."

"The Prince George's 3D Scholarship Program will provide students with an exceptional opportunity to complete high school diplomas, associate degrees, and baccalaureate degrees right here in Prince George's County. Studies show that students with well-founded critical thinking, problemsolving, and communication skills are far more likely to hold higher level positions, are more likely to be promoted and make considerably more money.

Earning their degrees early has the advantage of encouraging students to think "outside the box" in a critical way.

Prince George's Community College is excited to be a part of a bold partnership with Prince George's County Public Schools and the University of Maryland University College." said Charlene M. Dukes, president of Prince George's Community College. The first cohort of scholars for the Prince George's 3D Scholars Program is expected to start fall 2017.

Scholarship pays Tribute to Nursing Alumna

Nurses are pivotal to the care of their patients, especially those in intensive care. In 1969, Marilyn Elizabeth Suggs enrolled in the nursing program at Prince George's Community College. In 1972, she received her associate's degree and passed the State of Maryland licensing requirements to be certified as a Registered Nurse (RN). As a single mother of five children, a college education was essential to find employment and lay the foundation to provide for and raise her family. After a five-year battle with cancer, Marilyn Elizabeth Suggs died in 1999. Moved by the care their mother provided to others in the intensive care unit, her children established a scholarship for nurses at





Impact Grant Awards

Each year the Prince George's Community College Foundation awards Impact Grants to Prince George's Community College (PGCC) faculty and staff to implement new initiatives that support the strategic goals of the college and promote strategic partnerships with internal and external stakeholders. The FY2018 Impact Grants were awarded as follows:

Student Support Services—Supplemental Instruction (\$10,000)

Purpose: To reduce the achievement gap by helping students meet the demands of academic college level coursework. The supplemental instruction will strengthen connections with the academic departments and promote integrated planning, fiscal stability and the efficient use of resources, all with the goal of promoting student success by assisting students to succeed and graduate.

PGCC-TV SportsNest UNISET & NewTek Virtual Set Editor (\$10,000)

Purpose: To expand PGCC-TV's production capacity, allowing for seven unique set looks for use during on-camera broadcasts. This initiative will enable cost savings that result from the elimination of the investment in multiple stage backgrounds and props while providing teaching and learning components that expose students to real-world usage of technology to create virtual sets.

Owl Athletic Basketball Broadcasts Live for First Time

Owl Athletics men's and women's basketball games are now being broadcast live, thanks in part to a fiscal year 2017 Impact Grant from the Prince George's Community College Foundation, Inc. The Impact Grant was awarded to PGCC-TV to implement a new initiative that supports the strategic goals of the college. Pitting the Owls against Hagerstown Community College, the very first game broadcast on January 18, 2017, included the women tipping off at 5 p.m. and the men at 7 p.m.

"The live broadcast has emerged as a viable way for our athletics department to attract a larger audience," said Brenda Mitchell, executive director of the Prince George's Community College Foundation, Inc. Even more so now as the Owl Men's Basketball team earned their 4th win this season as the Maryland Junior College Athletic Conference Champions with a 63–62 victory over Baltimore City Community College.

The Impact Grant was designed to encourage collaboration and this project has given students the opportunity to gain an in-depth look into the programs the Mass Communications Department has to offer. Students orchestrated the majority of the onair, play-by-play sports commentary and technical tasks on the first broadcast. "The college is extremely proud of the tremendous work of our students," said Marshall Johnson, Jr., coordinator of PGCC-TV. "We are excited about this broadcast, and are exploring longterm options to broadcast more events." The Impact Grant Award Program is made possible through unrestricted gifts from faculty, staff, alumni, and friends of Prince George's Community College.

Through community partnerships such as this supportive grant awarded by the SunTrust Foundation, we will be able to put families and individuals throughout our area on track to achieve financial stability and independence around the region."

The Financial Empowerment Center at Prince George's Community College is the first of several centers United Way NCA plans to open across the region. These funds will help support programs such as credit counseling, budget management, housing counseling, financial workshops and the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA). The VITA program provides low to moderate income families throughout the region access to free tax preparation assistance to file their tax returns, maximize their available tax refunds, and gain access to the Earned Income Tax Credit.

"Helping build strong communities is a fundamental part of our organization, and we are honored to partner with United Way NCA to help fund the Financial Empowerment Center," said Dan O'Neill, president and CEO of SunTrust Bank's Greater Washington and Maryland Division.

The Financial Empowerment Center is located in the Center for Advanced Technology, Room 102 on the Largo campus.

Hours of Operation Monday and Thursday — 12 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday — 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Financial Empowerment Center also offers one-on-one financial coaching for individuals and small businesses. By recognizing financial goals, residents can create action plans towards decreasing debt, improving credit ratings and moving towards a business vision on sound financial footing. "Our plan is to help families do more than just survive, we will do more than that, we will help them thrive!" said Ms. Allen-Herring.


